#### **Making Plans - Weather**

Camano's greatest risk concerning disasters is severe weather. Understanding weather can help you become better prepared. Information for this portion of our newsletter comes from NW Meteorologist Ted Buehner; from NOAA; from the National Weather Service; from the Weather Channel; and from Island County Dept. of Emergency Management.

The term 'bomb cyclone' has recently become a part of the weather vocabulary. While meteorologists have used the term "bomb" regarding storms for decades, it was only after the term showed up in a Washington Post story that the term took on a life of its own.

Bomb cyclone is a shortened version of the term 'bombogenesis" which refers to a storm system that undergoes a rapid intensification process with the atmospheric pressure in the storm dropping at least twenty-four millibars in twentyfour hours. This rapid and steep drop causes the storm to strengthen explosively, which results in violent weather. This can happen when a cold air mass collides with a warm air mass. They occur most often over open water and are more common during winter months. They are most notable in regions like the eastern U.S. near the North Atlantic. As of 2021, there were only about eighteen bomb cyclones a year worldwide. They are, however, becoming more frequent. And for the PNW, when a bomb cyclone combines with an atmospheric river, the consequences are likened to an out-of-control fire hose.

\*\*\*\*April 25-27 – CERT Basic Training!!!! This course runs Friday evening from 6-9:30 pm and Saturday and Sunday from 9am-6:30pm. The course is free, though we do ask \$25/attendee to cover the cost of the basic PPE (personal protective equipment). We cover the cost of the backpack and the other items contained in it. CERT training covers basic preparedness; organizational skills; disaster medicine and medical logistics; disaster psychology; terrorism; fire and utility safety and fire suppression; and light search and rescue

including victim extrication and carry techniques. We strongly recommend at least two individuals from every neighborhood be CERT trained. The class size is limited, so if you wish to attend, you should register now. To do so, contact Rhonda Paulson at rspaulson.rp@gmail.com.

#### **Actions to take:**

Learn about local disaster risks. Understand what the commonality is regarding the consequences of these disasters and how to prepare for them. Know the locations of water and gas meters and how to shut them off. Keep an appropriate weather-protected wrench near the locations. Work with your children/grandchildren or





other children in your care to assemble an activity kit for them.

#### **News from CIFR**

The Camano Island Fire and Rescue (CIFR) Board of Fire Commissioners will meet on Monday, March 10, 2025, at 4:30 p.m. at the Fire Administration Office (811 N. Sunrise Blvd.) to discuss placing an EMS levy renewal on the August 5, 2025, primary election ballot. The public is encouraged to attend and provide input.

Emergency medical services now account for 68% of all calls. Meanwhile, inflation has significantly increased costs for emergency personnel, equipment and apparatus.

"We want to be transparent with the community," Fire Chief Jason Allen said. "Revenue is struggling to keep pace with the costs to provide service. Our priority is to ensure rapid, 24/7 medical response for the community, but we are stretched thin."

CIFR funds daily operations through two property tax levies – one for fire and another for EMS. In 2021, voters approved a \$0.50 EMS levy per \$1,000 of assessed property value. However, "levy erosion" — a cap limiting revenue growth to 1% annually despite rising property values — has reduced the rate to \$0.37. Over the past four years, the Consumer Price Index has surged nearly 22%, while EMS-related costs have escalated.

To address these challenges, the Board of Fire Commissioners is considering asking voters to restore the EMS levy – which must be renewed every six years – to the previously approved rate of \$0.50 in the August primary election.

If approved, the EMS renewal would fund additional emergency personnel, advanced training, and replace an ambulance. It would also pay for life-saving medical equipment, including a new cardiac monitor/defibrillator and a LUCAS Device (for automated chest compressions) to improve patient survival rates.

The proposed \$0.13 levy renewal would cost the owner of a \$650,000 property (the median assessed value for the area, per the County Assessor) an additional \$7.04 per month or \$84.50 annually.
