What to do Until Help Arrives

Preparedness State of Mind





Bill Swander's presentation regarding *What to do Until Help Arrives* walked us through critical situational awareness and the measures we can take when faced with injured individuals and when first responders are still minutes away. Quick thinking and your actions can, at the very least, help to stabilize injuries and give comfort. You may also save a life.



Preparedness should be a State of Mind in every aspect of our lives. Bill's second presentation addressed this, again speaking to the need for situational awareness and adding a consideration of the 'what ifs' we might encounter day-to-day. Recognizing the possibilities is the first step in planning and preparing for them. And once prepared, practicing our plans means we will be better able to focus and act quickly should the need arise. The 'what ifs' in our lives are truly endless. What if we have unexpected visitors for dinner? What if we have a flat tire? What if we witness an auto accident? What if severe weather causes an injury to someone in our household or neighborhood? What if we experience a major earthquake? None of these events are beyond our ability to act if we already have a plan (and a backup plan) in place. Understanding the possibilities and being situationally aware allows us to recognize situations as they occur. Being prepared to act on our plan makes us far more resilient as individuals, as neighborhoods, and as a community.





Making Plans - Weather

Camano's greatest risk concerning disasters is severe weather. Understanding weather can help you become better prepared.

Information for this portion of our newsletter comes from NW Meteorologist Ted Buehner; from NOAA; from the National Weather Service; from the Weather Channel; and from Island County Dept. of Emergency Management.

Per the National Weather Service, we can once again expect a warmer and drier than normal summer. Dry soil conditions are a particular concern with wildfire season. Be sure to attend our June 12th meeting. The program will be *Your House Can Survive a Wildfire*. Also, the Snohomish Conservation District is currently working with a wildfire resilience and forest health grant that includes a free wildfire risk home assessment for residents of Snohomish County and Camano Island. This grant runs out at the end of June. If you are interested in scheduling this assessment for your home or your neighborhood, contact snocd.org/assess. Communications

The Stanwood/Camano Amateur Radio Club will be participating in the annual ARRL Field Day the weekend of June 28-29. The event will take place at Arrowhead Ranch, 615 Arrowhead Road, Camano Island, beginning at 11 am on Saturday and running straight through to 11 am Sunday. During Field Day, our local ham radio operators practice disaster communications by making clear and concise contacts as quickly as possible. There is also a Get On The Air (GOTA) tent where you may try your hand at making contacts.

Planning Ahead for June

For those of you who are new to our newsletter, this segment allows for an ongoing look at spreading the cost of preparedness over a year rather than trying to acquire everything all at once. Also included are measures you can take to prepare for any emergency/disaster. For those who have been receiving our newsletter, it provides the opportunity to review your supplies and your plans.

Items to locate or purchase

Matches in waterproof container

Camping utility knife

Heavy hemp or cotton rope

Camp stove Hand warmers

Duct tape Deck of cards

Books Puzzles

Actions to take:

Locate an appropriate area for storage of disaster supplies. If possible, find a location that is easily accessible. It is wise to include extra clothing for each member of the household. Look into installing emergency ladders for the upper floors of your home. Photo inventory important/valuable household items and store in a lockbox or with an out-of-state friend or family member. Check batteries in items requiring them and replace where needed – this includes smoke alarms and carbon monoxide monitors.

Additional Considerations

Neighborhood Ready

If your neighborhood has not already done so, be sure to contact us to set up a time for our Neighborhood Ready training. The training is free. Our team will come to your neighborhood and will provide the materials to help you get started. The program includes information on personal preparedness, how to organize your neighborhood, the nine steps to take immediately following a disaster, and measures you can take that provide an
